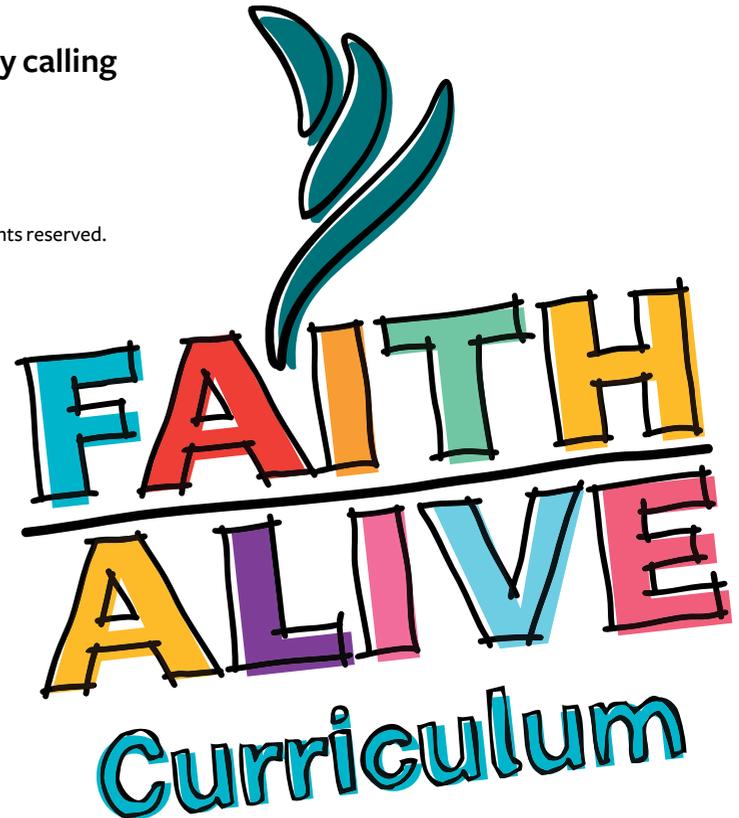

Scene 1

Characters: Israelites, Egyptians, Narrator, and Moses

Israelites: *[Pretend to work—making bricks, dragging a cart, building a pyramid; wipe sweat off forehead every now and again. Complain, using some of the following words.]*

This is hard work.

I'm hot.

I'm thirsty.

I could go for a tall cool drink.

Egyptians: *[Move over to the Israelites. Act superior and call out the following phrases.]*

Stop talking!

Get back to work!

Slaves don't get breaks!

Israelites: *[On knees, praying.]* God, help us!

Narrator: The Israelites were slaves in Egypt. They cried out to God to save them. God heard their cries and sent Moses.

Moses: Me? You'd think God would have chosen someone who could make good speeches. But no—God asked me. God said, "With my mighty hand I'll reach out and strike the Egyptians until Pharaoh will let my people go."

Scene 2

Characters: Moses, Pharaoh, and Aaron

Moses: *[speaking to Pharaoh]* The Lord God says, "Let my people go."

Pharaoh: No way! I'll lose all my workers! Instead I'll make them work twice as hard.

Aaron: *[to Moses]* That didn't work out so well.

Moses: *[to Aaron]* God isn't finished with Pharaoh yet. *[to Pharaoh]* Meet us at the Nile River.

Pharaoh: Nothing they can do can scare me.

Scene 3: Plague Chant

Characters: Narrator, Egyptians, Israelites, and Pharaoh

Narrator: There are boils everywhere.
All: Plague 6. Plague 6.
Narrator: There are boils everywhere.
Egyptians: We have sores on our skin. We hurt. We weep. Help us! Help us!
Israelites: Let us go. Let us go.
Pharaoh: No. No.
Narrator: There's hail everywhere.
All: Plague 7. Plague 7.
Narrator: There's hail everywhere.
Egyptians: Killing our animals and smashing our plants. Help us! Help us!
Israelites: Let us go. Let us go.
Pharaoh: No. No.
Narrator: There are locusts everywhere.
All: Plague 8. Plague 8.
Narrator: There are locusts everywhere.
Egyptians: Eating all the crops. We're so hungry. Help us! Help us!
Israelites: Let us go. Let us go.
Pharaoh: No. No.
Narrator: There's darkness everywhere.

All: Plague 9. Plague 9.
Narrator: There's darkness everywhere.
Egyptians: Three days—can't see. We're scared. Help us! Help us!
Israelites: Let us go. Let us go!
Pharaoh: No. No.

Scene 4

Characters: Israelite child, Moses, Egyptian, Pharaoh

[Plague 10. The Israelite child stands at the door of meeting room with container of red paint and a brush.]

Israelite child: What will happen now?

Moses: Don't worry. God has one more plague, and then we'll be free. Paint your doorframes with a lamb's blood.

Israelite child: What difference will the blood on my doorframe make?

Moses: The angel of death will come to each house tonight. It's the final plague. The lamb's blood is a sign that we are part of God's people. All who put a lamb's blood on their doorpost will be safe. The angel of death will pass over those houses.

Israelite child: I'm scared.

Moses: It's all right. God will protect us and save us.

Narrator: That night, the angel of death came and killed the firstborn son of every family in Egypt. But the angel saw the lamb's blood on the doorpost of the Israelite houses and knew that they were God's people. All the Israelite children lived.

Pharaoh: Moses, your God is too powerful. I give up. Take your people and go. Go far away before anything worse happens.

Moses: Thank you, God.

Egyptians: *[Pretend to give the Israelites gold, silver, jewelry and valuables.]* Go. Go away. Take our gold and leave us alone.

Israelite child: Our God is mighty.

Everyone: Sing "What a Mighty God We Serve."

Moses, the People, and God's Commandments

Moses: *[with a trembling voice]* LORD, is thaaaat you?

LORD: I am the LORD your God. I brought you out of slavery in Egypt. Do not make anything more important than me. Do not make statues of gods that look like anything in the sky or on the earth or in the waters. Do not bow down to them or worship them. I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God. Do not swear falsely or carelessly using the name of the LORD your God. Remember to keep the Sabbath day holy. Do all your work in six days. And set the seventh day apart in honor of your God. Honor your father and mother. Do not murder. Do not be unfaithful to your marriage partner. Do not steal. Do not lie. Do not be jealous of anything that belongs to someone else.

Narrator: God also gave Moses instructions about the treatment of servants and the building of the tabernacle, about justice and mercy. It took many days. Let's check on the people to see what they were doing while God spoke to Moses.

Aaron: I'm Aaron—Moses' brother Aaron. Moses has been gone all of last month and now half of this month. Where is he? No one could possibly talk to God that long. I wonder if a wild animal got the best of him? Or maybe he decided to abandon us. I wouldn't blame him. These people complain constantly. I hear them again this morning.



Poke each other and act impatient during the grumbling.

Israelites: Where's Moses?
I thought he was our leader.
Doesn't he care about us?

In Egypt we had a leader.
Yeah, life was better there.

Are you guys forgetting what Moses said?
Remember, we've gotta have faith and courage. This is just a test.
I don't think a test takes this long.
I say let's do something.
Get Aaron. He's a priest. He can make a new god for us.
Aaron, come here.

Aaron: Here I am.

Israelites: Make us a god who will lead us.
This fellow Moses brought us up out of Egypt.
But we don't know what happened to him.

Aaron: *[whispering to himself]* The people are angry and restless. I'm afraid they'll hurt me. There are so many of them. I have to make them happy.

Aaron: People, listen to me! Bring me your gold. The Egyptians heaped jewelry and gold on us when we left.



Reach into the tent for the jewels.

Aaron: I'll throw some of that gold into a fire, melt it down, and make a god as golden as the ones you saw in Egypt.

Aaron: Here. Here is your god.



Pretend to carry jewels to center of story area. Stay in center until the voice of God calls. Feel the heat from the fire made to melt the gold.

Israelites: This is our god.
Our god who brought us out of Egypt.
Our god who saves us.
Praise to our god.



Dance around the calf, shouting and clapping.

Aaron: Don't forget the LORD. Here, I'll build an altar next to the calf and tomorrow we'll have a festival to the LORD.

Israelites: Forget that.
We have our god now.

Voice of God: Moses. *[pause]*



Pause in the dancing at the first sound of God's voice.

Voice of God: I am the LORD your God, but the people below this mountain—the ones you brought out of Egypt—have forgotten me. They have become very sinful. I will destroy them.

Moses: Don't be angry with your people. You brought them out of Egypt with great power and a mighty hand. If you destroy them, the Egyptians will say you brought them out to kill them. Please take pity on your people.

God: All right, Moses. I will not destroy them. Take the commandments I have written on the stone tablets and give them to the people.

Moses: *[grunts]* I'm not a young man anymore—carrying these stone tablets all the way down the mountain is hard work. But these commandments written on stone should impress the people. Whew! They're getting heavy.

Moses: What's going on? It sounds like singing and dancing. The people are dancing and worshiping a golden idol. The LORD was right. They have forgotten their true God. These stone commandments from God will mean nothing to these people.



Return to tents in fear at the sound of stones crashing.

Moses: Aaron, Aaron.

Aaron: Moses, you're back!

Moses: Have you led these people into such great sin?

Aaron: We . . . didn't think you were coming back. The people—they made me take their jewelry. I threw it into the fire—and poof! This calf just magically appeared.

Moses: Burn the idol. Melt it down and pour it into the water.

Moses: Anyone who is on the LORD's side, come to me.



Kneel beside their tents.

Israelites: The LORD.

Yes, we forgot the LORD.

We need God to be with us.

We will die without God.

Never again will I lose my faith in God.

God: I am the LORD. I am a God who is tender and kind. I am gracious. I am slow to get angry. I am faithful and full of love. I continue to show my love to thousands of people. I forgive those who sin. But I do not let guilty people go without punishing them.

I will give them a new set of tablets with my commandments. My laws will help the people love me and love each other.

Commandment Scenarios

Out of the Strong Came Weakness and Out of the Weak Came Strength

Voices

Samson	Guard
Samson's mother	Philistine 1

Samson's brother—Jair	Crowd

Note: If you used the optional Hello activity, put two of the end links of the paper chain over Samson's hands.

Philistine 1: Dagon, the fish god, the god of the sea, has rescued us.

Philistine 2: Our god has delivered Samson into our hands.

Crowd: Fish. Fish. Our god is the big fishy.

Zebul: Listen to them. Their fish god is not even a live fish.

Jair: But they can celebrate. They've captured Samson, the only Israelite who could have saved us.

Samson's mother: My boy, Samson. They have taken my boy.

Samson's father: The story of our son should have ended differently.

Samson's mother: Yes. I still remember the day the angel came. He told me I would have a special baby. A son who would grow up to belong to God and save us from the Philistines.

Samson's father: Remember how carefully we obeyed the angel's instructions? We never cut his hair or gave him wine to drink.

Samson's mother: Yes, all to prove he was set apart by God—set apart to be the strong one who could deliver us from the Philistines.

Crowd: We want Samson. We want Samson.

Zebul: Come on, Mom and Dad. We don't want to be around these drunken Philistines. The best thing we can do is leave and pray to God to deliver Samson.

Philistine 1: Samson. Samson. Bring out Samson so we can make fun of the weak, blind man. He tied torches to the tails of foxes and sent them through our fields. But he won't bother us ever again!

Philistine 2: And never again will he rip out the gates of our city.

Philistine 1: Right. Never again can he hurt us. He's weaker than a baby!

[Guard walks Samson to the front.]

Guard: Come on. Just a few more steps. Lift up your feet so that you don't stumble.

Samson: I can hear the crowd. They're poking fun of me.

Philistine 1: Samson, we thought your God made you strong.

Zebul: God, don't you hear our enemies mocking you? Deliver us!

Philistine 2: Our fishy god rules over the God of the Israelites.

Delilah: Don't give Fishy so much credit. *I* was the one who brought Samson down.

Philistine 1: Was it your beauty or your smarts that captured Samson?

Delilah: Both, of course. I batted my beautiful eyes, pouted my painted lips, and said to Samson: "So tell me, big guy—what makes you so strong?"

At first he lied. He told me that tying him up with leather straps would make his strength go away. But I tried it, and he was as strong as ever.

"What makes you so strong, Samson?" I begged again. This time he said that tying him with new ropes would take away his strength. But that wasn't true either.

After he lied the third time, I made him feel really bad. I whined and pouted until he finally gave in and told me his secret.

Philistine 2: What was it?

Delilah: A secret from his God. Samson told me that his parents had promised God that their son would never cut his hair. As long as Samson kept that promise, he would stay strong. Something about his voice told me this was the big one—the real truth. So I put him to sleep and cut off his hair.

Philistine 1: *[laughing]* And that's where we came in and captured the fool.

Delilah: Yeah. It's spooky though, thinking about a God who really can make an agreement like that with people. I'll just stick with Dagon the fish god. I'm not into commitments.

Samson: Guard. Tell me why the people are celebrating.

Guard: They're offering a great sacrifice to their god Dagon because he handed you over to them.

Samson: Dagon didn't do a thing. It was all my fault for disobeying the true God. How many people are out there?

Guard: All the Philistine rulers are in the temple—plus thousands of others. And there must be about three thousand men and women on the roof above you.

Samson: *[Prays to God]* My LORD and my king, show me that you are still with me. Please make me strong again. *[speaks to the guard]* Guard, lead me to the two pillars in the middle of the temple.

Guard: *[leads Samson]* What are you going to do?

Samson: Don't trust in me! Trust in the one true God. Now run for your life.

Guard: *[minutes later, outside the temple]* It was the most awful and amazing thing I ever saw! Samson put his right hand on one of the pillars and his left hand on the other. Then he leaned against them and pushed with all his might. And the temple came down! It fell. All the rulers and others who were in the temple mocking Samson and his God were destroyed! It fell on all the people who were calling out to Fishy to save them.

Jair: After it was all over, my brothers and I went down to get Samson's body. We brought it home and buried him in our family tomb. Samson killed more Philistines on that day than in his whole lifetime. And the Philistines who are left are afraid of us. They finally know the truth: that our God is a mighty God.


