INTRODUCTION

ome and See... is a discipleship manual that has taken the Contemporary Testimony Our World Belongs to God, from the Christian Reformed Church of North America, and divided 58 paragraphs into 25 chapters. The 2008 edition of 58 paragraphs moves from the beginning of time, when God created all things good, to discovering what went wrong in this world and how God worked on making things right by sending his son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, to grow a new community called "the church," giving the church a mission and purpose, to the end of time as we know it today. This manual has 4 teachings on Creation, 4 teachings on the Fall, 4 teachings on Jesus and his Redemption, 4 teachings on the Holy Spirit, 4 teachings on God's New People, and 4 teachings on the Mission of God's People. The final chapter is on the New Creation.

Each chapter begins with Contemporary Testimony paragraphs, followed by "Encouraging Conversation" questions to stimulate dialogue and discussion. The second section is called "Entering God's Word," taking a primary Bible passage with questions designed to explore the text. All genres of scripture in both the Old and New Testament are explored, including historical narrative, poetic, prophetic, gospels, epistles and apocalyptic writings. The third section is called "Enhancing Our Thought," serving as a one-page written reflection on the topic at hand. The final section includes a Spiritual Discipline on week one, a Personal Reflection on week two, an Action Response on week three, and a Food Celebration on the fourth week. Also included on the fourth page are Echoes from a Confessional Past and Extra Readings on the topic discussed, for those wanting to go deeper.

Come and See...Our World Belongs to God is a discipleship manual written and designed to help high school students, new believers, small groups, and followers of Jesus discover God's love in the unfolding of His kingdom, seeing ourselves as Christ's ambassadors through the working of the Holy Spirit. Entering scripture is learning to live out of God's word as the Holy Spirit transforms our flesh into being His living word. Each writing reflects themes laid out in the Contemporary Testimony paragraphs. There was a pastor and politician who became Prime Minister of Holland, Abraham Kuyper, who wrote daily newspaper articles in the Netherlands, in the late 1890s and early 1900s, exclusively on the kingdom of God. As a prominent theologian, educator and politician who began the Christian school movement, Kuyper proclaimed at the opening of a Christian university "There is not a square inch in the whole domain of our human existence over which Christ, who is Sovereign over all, does not cry: Mine!"

Following Jesus is a lifelong journey of growing in his presence, and this discipleship manual hopes to assist in that growth. For all who want to follow, Jesus says, "Come and see…" He takes us as we are and offers forgiveness, teaching, training and transformation, by adopting us as a sister/brother and giving us freedom and ambassadorship in His kingdom. He introduces His Father in heaven as our Father in heaven, and sends His Holy Spirit to enter our inner being, calling our body home. The invitation from God has been extended a long time ago and is still extended to our lives today. Come and See... Our World Belongs to God.

ENHANCING OUR THOUGHT: GOD'S WORD LIVES IN OUR FLESH

hereas Mark began his Gospel with John the Baptist and Matthew began his with a genealogy reaching back to David and Abraham and Luke's genealogy goes all the way back to Adam, the Gospel of John begins his revelation of Jesus with the story of creation. John echoes the words of Genesis 1:1-3, saying, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made" (John 1:1-3). John used the Greek word "logos" for "word" and "reason" as marking the beginning of creation. Greeks spoke of reason being the universal principle that governed all things in their world. On the other hand, Jews had the highest regard for "the word," as pointing to God and, in John's case, "was God." John used "the word" so both Jews and Greeks (Gentiles) could be drawn into the gospel story. Jews and Christians alike believe that all things were created in and through God's word. John begins his gospel by echoing the opening words of scripture in Genesis 1.

In Genesis 1 we read: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light" (Genesis 1:1-3). God the Father was present, as well as the Holy Spirit hovering over the waters. Then the author of Genesis writes; "And God said, 'Let there be light." Those spoken words are what brought light into being. That is God's creating word. God then spoke expanse between the waters, calling sky and water into being. Third, God called dry ground to appear and it was so. Using words, God called this world into being.

God also spoke words to Adam and Eve, Cain and Enoch, Noah and Abraham and Jacob and Moses too. God's verbal speaking to mankind is called a "theophany." The Ten Commandments are a theophany, where we read "God spoke all these words, saying "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery" (Exodus 20:1). In the New Testament, when Jesus was being baptized by John, God spoke and said, "This is my Son whom I love. With Him I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). God spoke to people who heard and understood him.

A third use of "God's word" comes in the writings of Moses and the prophets, in prayers and poetry, in the gospel writings and letters from the apostles, giving us 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 books in the New Testament. "No prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation. For prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit" (2 Peter 1:20–21). Both words in the Old Testament and the New Testament give special insight and revelation into who God is, as creator, sustainer, redeemer and restorer. Then John adds to the definition of "word."

John says, "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). This same word, who created the heavens and the earth, who is God, became one of us. Jesus is the one who came to redeem this world and restore that which God created. John says that God loved this "cosmos" so much that he gave this world His one and only Son, that whoever believes in him will find everlasting life.

Finally, through the working of the Holy Spirit, God's word enters our being and begins to live through us. "For the word of God is living and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joint and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart. Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight" (Hebrews 4:12-13). God's word changes us and transforms our lives to live for him, giving God all glory, and honour and praise. God has the first, last and every spoken word in between.

EXERCISING SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE: SOLITUDE AND SILENCE

Carve out a measurable block of time, fifteen minutes this week, a half hour next week, one hour the third week and three hours in the fourth week, where you experience solitude and silence. Eliminate all sounds possible: no music, no electronic stimulation, no traffic, no voices, and no talking yourself. One gains a deeper appreciation of words when challenged to use them sparingly. Listen for the natural sounds of wind in the trees, birds, running water, your heart beating and your breathing. This is also known as the discipline of not having the last word.

Read Psalm 46 in your period of silence.

Journaling thoughts and words that you receive from the Lord may enhance your communication and commu
nion in this block of silence. End your time of silence with words of praise and thanksgiving directed to the Lord.

ENHANCING OUR THOUGHT: "IT IS VERY GOOD!"

ublic elementary schools and high schools, and secular colleges and universities all teach curriculum on how the world began. Most educational institutions teach two theories, called "big bang," or evolutionary principles. It is important to realize that both are called theories: "The Theory of Evolution" and "The Big Bang Theory." Public schools and secular colleges and universities have created a dividing line between science and religion, between facts and faith, between the mind and the soul. Most secular institutions work to exclude any notion of God from the conversation surrounding the beginning of the universe. Christian schools, colleges, and universities usually begin with God in their conversations of origin and have faith with facts, minds that strengthen understandings of the heart and soul and religion presented as complimenting the work of science. Christian scientists will testify to their work enhancing their marvel and understanding of God and his creation.

The "Big Bang Theory" speaks of an expanding universe which began through an explosion approximately 13.8 billion years ago. After the explosion the universe cooled down, allowing subatomic particles to form into simple atoms, with gravity creating stars and planets, that slowly evolved into what we know as earth. There is no explanation of the matter created prior to the explosion, or the ability for the intricacies of life to form out of matter. It takes faith to believe in "The Big Bang Theory." The same with the "Theory of Evolution." In 1859 Charles Darwin wrote *The Origin of Species* where molecules and organisms expand into every kind of species, creating the biological organisms we have today. It takes a lot of faith to believe that one species has evolved into another, through a period of 3.5 to 3.8 billion years, beginning with tadpoles and evolving into the intricacies of humanity. There are scientists who believe in a Prime Mover God, an initial intelligent being, who created all things to have their being. That's where Christians allow Genesis 1 to give insight to their understanding of the origins of creation.

Genesis 1 has God speaking creation into being, and everything that God created was good. On the first day God created light. He separated light from darkness and called the light day and the darkness night. On the second day God separated the water from the water and created an expanse that he called sky. And it was good. On the third day God created dry land, gathering the water together in one place and creating land in another. On the land he planted trees and seed-bearing plants. On the fourth day God took what he created in day one and filled it with the sun in the day and stars and the moon at night. On the fifth day God took what he created in day two and filled the sky with birds and the waters with fish. On the sixth day God took what he created on day three and filled the land with animals, both wild and domestic and it was still all good. For his crowning act, God created mankind whom he called his image bearers, as he created male and female and gave them a mandate to be caretakers of his creation and this, he said, was "very good."

On the seventh day we are told God rested. On that day all of creation was to glorify God and enjoy him together. Six days of labour and one day of rest was a created rhythm which many still follow to this day. It takes faith to believe in a creator God, but this creator God is also tied to a written word of wisdom literature that also records the history of a chosen people known as the Jews. From the Jewish people came the person Jesus, who claimed to be God's Son. When Jesus left this world, he poured out his Holy Spirit on people who believe in Him and the church of Jesus Christ has been growing every decade and century and millennium since. All of this is tied to God who created this world in six days and after creating this world said, "It is very good."

Carve out a measurable block of time, a period of a half hour, where you experience silence. Eliminate all sounds possible: no music, no electronic stimulation, no traffic, no voices, and no talking yourself. This is also known as the discipline of not having the last word.
