

He has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood,<sup>4</sup> and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil.<sup>5</sup> He also watches over me in such a way<sup>6</sup> that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven:<sup>7</sup> in fact, all things must work together for my salvation.<sup>8</sup>

Because I belong to him, Christ, by his Holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life<sup>9</sup> and makes me wholeheartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him.<sup>10</sup>

### **Murder in Church**

It's no accident that the Catechism begins with comfort. When the authors of the Catechism sat down to write in 1562, they had just received reports that dozens of Huguenots—French followers of John Calvin—had been slaughtered while worshiping in church. Their attackers—a group of French Catholics—killed sixty Huguenots and wounded two hundred more. In the years that followed, some ten thousand Huguenots died for their faith. Torture was common: men were usually burned at the stake; women were buried alive.

# <Main Event>

1. When people are hurting, where are some of the places they look for comfort and help?

- 2. Underline what the Catechism says is our *only* comfort. What do you think it means when it says that this is our *only* comfort?
- 3. Look up the Scripture passages under the first three footnotes to Q&A 1. Find a phrase in each passage that says we belong to Jesus.
- 4. Privately remember a time when you especially needed God's comfort and strength (or imagine such a time in the future). Then circle one thing in answer 1 that would give you comfort and hope and strength in such a situation.

# <Follow-up>

True comfort is not a strong hand we can cling to when life's storms or death's floods sweep over our heads. It is a powerful hand that holds onto us with a grip that nothing can break. Comfort is Christ's holding on to us when we lack the strength to hold on to him. We know his power is greater than ours—greater than the devil's or death's—and that he will never let us go. We belong to him. *That's* our true comfort.

### How do you react to this picture of comfort?

- □ I can see it clearly and know in my heart that it's true.

# 2 Q. What must you know to live and die in the joy of this comfort?

- **A.** Three things: first, how great my sin and misery are;<sup>1</sup> second, how I am set free from all my sins and misery;<sup>2</sup> third, how I am to thank God for such deliverance.<sup>3</sup>

# <Main Event>

## Misery (Sin)

Read Romans 3:9-12 and the first line of answer 2.

1. If you were an artist who wanted to illustrate human misery, what might you sketch? Make a simple drawing or just describe your sketch in words. Or, if you prefer, pantomime how people feel when they suddenly realize they've messed up big-time.

- 2. "To know real joy in God, [we need to] know inside and out, up and down, through and through, how full of sin we are. We're just fooling ourselves if we think we're without sin. And that's not easy for anyone to confess. Nobody wants to look bad" (*Every Bit of Who I Am*, p. 17). What do you think the Catechism means about *knowing* how great our sin and misery are, and why is that necessary?
- 3. What does this part of answer 2 tell us we need to experience on a day-to-day basis?
- 4. What Q&A's are included in the Misery (Sin) section of the Catechism?

### **Deliverance (Salvation)**

Read Romans 5:6-9 and the second line of answer 2.

1. If you were an artist who wanted to illustrate deliverance from sin, what might you sketch? Make a simple drawing or just describe your sketch in words. Or, if you prefer, pantomime how people feel when they realize they've been forgiven for doing something pretty awful.

2. What do you think the Catechism means about *knowing* how we are set free from our sin and misery? What exactly do we need to know?

- 3. What does this part of answer 2 tell us we need to experience on a day-to-day basis?
- 4. What Q&A's are included in the Deliverance (Salvation) section of the Catechism? What creed is explained in this section?

### **Gratitude (Service)**

Read Romans 12:1 and the third line of answer 2.

 If you were an artist who wanted to illustrate a life of gratitude and service, what might you sketch? Make a simple drawing or describe your sketch in words. Or, if you prefer, pantomime what a life of gratitude and service might look like.

- 2. What do you think the Catechism means about *knowing* how we are to thank God for our deliverance? What does the Catechism mean by *know*? According to the Catechism, what would our motivation be for taking time to help out a neighbor or friend?
- 3. What does this part of answer 2 tell us we need to experience on a day-to-day basis?

4. What Q&A's are included in the Gratitude (Service) part of the Catechism? What prayer is found there? What guide to Christian living?
